I was born in New York City September 10, 1882. My father Abraham Edelman was born near Hief Russia 1865, and emigrated to America 1880. After arriving in New York City he took on odd jobs until 1884 when he became interested in what the "Baron De Hersh Colonization Project " had to offer. Baron To Hersh was a millionaire Jew residing in New York City who wished to help the poor Jewish psonle. He conceived the idea that he could best do that by taking them to North Dakota where they each could get a free homestead of 160 norse good farming land and therefore he sent out his agents to look for a suitable location that had room for at least 50 families. The agents found two such locations, one was near tehley, F.D. and the other about 25 miles northeast of the city of Devils Lake, and it was to the last named project my people came. Pather started for North Dakots and filed on his homestend nortenst of Devile Lake 1986 and so did fifty other Jewish Inmily men from New York City. Fach was give 51000.00 to start farming with and in that way the members of this colony had a good start but only very few of these Jews were farmers or capable of being made farmers out of, and when the dry years of 1885-6-and 7, came it scared nearly all of them out of the country, most of them went east but just where I do not know.

Only about 20 families stayed, and they did well on their farms.

Mr. 8. Goodman's wife was barnt to don'th in a prairie fire 1987, and it brought great sorrow to the colony. It was castomary to place a stone over the grave at time of burial, but in that part of the country there were no stones, and so they placed the claim shock over the grave, but later an other fire came and burnt the claimshock too, and that made things still worse

Educational facilities were not the best in the new colony but the religious doctrine and practices were kept up, and devotional exercises were carried on in the homes but after a while a school-house was built and then the devotion was carried on there. The Jews do not have baptism, but male children are circumcised while

female children have a prayer said over them by the Rabbi

The Jews keep the Sabbath on Saturday and work on Sunday. Rabbi M. Glicok served our community from 1886 to 1896, by that time so many Jowe had left the farms that it became hard to support the church organization. Being born in this country I know very little about labor conditions in the Old Country, but often heard father say that we should be glad that we were in America and not in Russia where it was hard to make a living either by work or in business unless you had a big business, however, the Jews always made it a practice to start in a business that they could handle even if it had to be at first only to buy rags, but they would continue to live within their means and lay aside a little at a time until they could take on a bigger business. In this way many of the great financiers that this country has had worked up from the very smallest beginning.

I know nothing about the recreational features over in the Old Country nor do I know about the songs, dances, or weddings.

The reason that father emigrated from Russia was purely economical. I do not believe that the Jews were oppressed in Russia at that time. He was just following the general atream of emigration to America that was taking place at that time and expected to greatly better his own and familie's living cenditions, as everything was meager in the Old Country.

I do not believe that my people had made any special preparation for the 'trip to America. I think they just

got their clothing together and went with the crowd. The trip was financed by SaronDeHersh in New York who tryed to help a large number of Jewish people by setting them up on farms in North Dakota. I do not think that anyone of the group that came at the time my parents came had any property while in Russia, and so they had nothing to dispose of, and they had nothing outside of their wearing apparel to bring with them. About fifty families came at the same time from the Kief district in Russia and nearly all of them dame to the Devile Lake district about the same time that my father did. That is the married men would start out first and later when they had established themselves then their families would join them. In that way I did not get to North Dakota until 1890 while father came 1884.

As stated before my parents started from Ref Russia for America 1880 and four years later father came to the Devils Lake territory and squatted on a homestead 24 miles northeast of Devils Lake, R.D. I have never heard how the osean voyage was, only that they were severely erowded on the boat and that they were glad when they first saw land in America. After getting off the boat they were taken care of by Jews that lived in the city until they could provide quarters for them-selves.

Since I was born in New York after my folks had recided there two years I know practically nothing about the conditions under which my parents first lived in

I joined my father on his farm NE of Devile Lake and worked with him on that farm for the next 15 years. We did quite well on the farm, father continued to farm until 1917 when because of age he had to retire. After leaving father's farm 1905 I engaged in the Hotel business at Hansboro, N.D., and later moved to Devils Lake where I took charge of the Cavella Hotel, and still later the Meeter Hotely, after which I entered the Automobile business 1925, and in 1932 I started my precent grocery business here at 701, 2nd.St.

When I was farming we had no farm tractors or tracker implents, it was all horse drawn farm implents, and that is about the only difference in farming now and them with the exception of that we were not then restricted to farming a certain number of scree as under the AAA. Our worst drawbacks were the years of drought but otherwise we did well on the farm.

soon be unable to pay rents, taxes, and salaries.

In the spring of 1924 I married Pather Greenberg . We have two daughters: Francis 25 years old, Irine 23 years old both have received a highschool education under our liberal school system in America.

We have always spoken English in the house. I have always taken the daily papers and the folks get magazines of various kinds from the news stand.

The form of recreation my family enjoy is games of sport like baseball, foot ball, etc., and the movies.

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I did not favor America going into the World War. I did not lose money in post war bank failures.
