Kate Fuglei (Rachel Calof) got her professional start at the Guthrie Theater, and has played leading roles on stage across America, Credits include Mrs. Webb in Our Town for Tony Awarding-winning director Michael Greif at the La Jolla Playhouse, The Adult Woman in the Broadway National Tour of Spring Awakening directed by Tony Awarding winner Michael Mayer, Maria in Love's Labour's Lost at New York Shakespere Festival, and a new staging of Willa Cather's My Antonia, directed by Scott Schwartz, with music by Stephen Schwartz.

Other stage credits include McCarter Theater, Arena Stage, Hartford Stage, Seattle's ACT, Portland Stage and Utah Shakespeare Festival.

Film credits include The Onion Movie, the Green Hornet, Nowhereland, Indictment: The McMartin Trial, Amish Grace, and two films soon to be released: Forty is the New Dead and Ryder and Julina, TV credits include Touch, 90210, The Event, Love That Girl, Desperate Housewives, N.C.I.S., The Closer, Nip/Tuck, and many others including upcoming Masters of Sex on Showtime. Kate is married to writer Ken LaZebnik – proud mother of two sons Jack and Ben.

Ellen S. Pressman (Director) is an Emmy Award-winner who began her career as an Associate Producer on Hill Street Blues, and then began producing and directing for L.A. Law and Thirtysomething. She has also directed episodes of My So-Called Life, Party of Five, Arliss, Felicity, Buffy the Vampire Slayer, Charmed, Time of Your Life, 413 Hope Street, Pasadena, Huff, Jack and Bobby, Everwood, and Windfall. On stage she directed Frankie and Johnny in the Claire de Lune and the workshop production of Rachel Calof at Ensemble Studio Theater West. She is a graduate of the University of California, Berkeley.

Ken LaZebnik (Playwright) is a playwright and screen writer whose work has been produced at theaters across America. His plays Vestibular Sense, League of Nations, Calvinisms, and On the Spectrum all received their world premiere at Mixed Blood Theatre under the direction of Jack Reuler. On the Spectrum was awarded a Steinberg Citation from the American Theatre Critics Association honoring it as

one of the three best new plays produced outside of New York in 2011. He has a long history of writing for Garrison Keillor's *Prairie Home Companion* radio show. Ken wrote the Lionsgate film Thomas Kikade's *Christmas Cottage* starring Peter O'Toole. For TV, he has written episodes for many series including *Touched By an Angel, Providence, Army Wives, and Star Trek: Enterprise.* He wrote three PBS specials for their series *In Concert at the White House* filmed in the East Room of the White House. Ken is currently writing for an upcoming Hallmark Channel show, *When Calls the Heart.* He lives in Los Angeles with his wife Kate and is the proud father to their two sons Jack and Ben.

Leslie Steinweiss (Music & Lyrics) Most recently created a concert piece, Flight of Fancy for Clarinet and Piano, was premiered in Cambridge, MASS. He is current working on a Trio for Piano, Clarinet, and Viola. Rachel Calof: was featured at the Association for Jewish Theatre Conference in Los Angeles and was presented at the NYC international fringe theater festival. Leslie also has created music for short films and PBS documentaries. He was composer-in-residence for the theater company Dearknows in New York City, with works performed at Lincoln Center, Home for Contemporary Theater and Art in New York City, and the Whole Theater in Montclair, NJ. The School of Jolly Dogs, a British Music Hall with book and lyrics by Didi Balle, was work-shopped and performed at Eugene O'Neill Theater Center and produced by the St. Lawrence Theater Festival. Other film credits include independent films and collaborative work with his filmmaker wife, Marjory Steinweiss, including Open Lines, an award-winning short directed and edited by Marjory and featured at the Breckenridge, Chicago and Saaabrucken film festivals.

Ross Källing (Pianist) Mr. Källing is an award winning musical director and pianist. He received Dramalogue awards for his musical direction of FATE's, production of 'Marat/Sade' and 'Threepenny Opera'. Also was pianist/M.D. for the revival of 'Liz Swados' 'Nightclub Cantata' at the Odyssey Theatre and produced the song 'It Don't Make a Difference in the Dark', for the movie 'Relative Strangers', coaxing respectable vocal performances out of the stars, Danny Devito and Cathy Bates. He was Musical Director at the prestigious Beverly Hills Playhouse for fifteen years, where he worked with such stars as Anthony Head, Doris Roberts, Dorothy Lyman, Jeffrey Tambor and such directors as Gene Reynolds and the late Milton Katselas. He was the founding director of Music Curriculum at the Academy for New Musical Theatre in Los Angeles where he remains active as an instructor and dramaturge. As a composer/lyricist his own plays have been produced in Los Angeles, New York, London, Chicago and Seattle. He can be seen performing around Los Angeles in various Cabaret or Jazz venues or with his classical chamber ensemble, Trio Cayenne or teaching voice in his Burbank vocal studio.


Rare Native Prairie Greets Visitors

The spectacular view at the Sons of Jacob Cemetery is only heightened via the fact that it is surrounded by a strip of untouched native prairie. One of the last remaining pieces of native prairie in the region, it allows the visitor to view the land in the same way Rachel Calof and the original settlers would have. Before Euro-American farmers started breaking up the sod, mixed-grass prairie covered about 85% of North Dakota. Today, mixed-grass prairie as it exists at the Sons of Jacob Cemetery, can be found in only about 30% of the state. This type of prairie is called a Drift Prairie or Glaciated Plains and contains mixed -grass prairie plants. A mixed-grass prairie is a combination of tallgrass and shortgrass species.

Much like the Jewish Homesteaders, the prairie plants developed and thrived because of their deep root systems. These extremely deep roots enable the grasses and flowers to withstand certain conditions others could not survive. These conditions included the following: (1) low amounts of precipitations; (2) long, cold winters, hot summers, and strong winds; and (3) frequent fires. Spring and early summer wildflowers caress the cemetery and "dot" the border with color; but the diversity of this stretch of native prairie is extensive and most remarkably visible in mid to late summer when the warm season wild flowers are at their peak.

History of the Garske Colony

"The Garske Colony was not the first community to have Jewish settlers, but it was one that succeeded. Eventually 90 Jewish men and women filed claims in Ramsey County for land in this area. German Philanthropist Baron de Hirsch played an important part in the establishment of the Garske Colony. He believed that Jews would be better accepted in the United States if they were more like their neighbors and that translated into farming. Thus many settlers received funds (from Baron de Hirsch) before making their way to North Dakota. The Minneapolis Jewish community and other communities in the United States sent food and money to help the settlers over the difficult times.



Typically, the homesteaders would stay on the land the required number of years in order to receive their land patent. If their attempts at farming were unsuccessful, as most were, many homesteaders sold the land and used the money to move to larger cities. Some moved into the closest town, Devils Lake, to become peddlers, storekeepers or railroad construction workers.

Devils Lake had a full Jewish communal life. Jewish High Holiday services were held in the courthouse and it was said, that court dates were not set in the fall of the year until holiday dates were scheduled. Most Jewish settlers adhered to Orthodox traditions. Rabbi Benjamin Papermaster was Grand Forks, ND's first rabbi arriving in 1891. He traveled to serve the Garske community as needed and would come every fall with provisions and to help prepare kosher meat for the oncoming winter." (www.sojnorthdakota.com)


